#### Dr. Dennis G. Maki, MD

Dr. Maki is the Ovid O. Meyer Professor of Medicine in the Divisions of Infectious Diseases and Pulmonary-Critical Care Medicine at the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health in Madison, Wisconsin, attending physician in the UWHC Center for Trauma and Life Support and eICU, and former Head of the Division of Infectious Diseases 1979 through 2007.

Dr Maki, a 1967 graduate of the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health, did his internal medicine residency training on the Harvard Medical Service of the Boston City Hospital, where he was the Chief Resident, and the Massachusetts General Hospital, where he also did his fellowship in infectious diseases, and during this period spent two years as an Epidemic Intelligence Service Officer with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. An infectious disease consultant, critical care physician and epidemiologist, he has devoted his research career to the prevention of nosocomial infections and management of life-threatening infections, and has published 370 original papers, editorials, chapters and reviews and more than 700 abstracts of research presented at national or international scientific meetings; his publications have been cited by other researchers more than 20,000 times and provide much of the scientific underpinning for the "bundle" of measures currently employed for prevention of line sepsis in hospitals worldwide. A past consultant to the CDC, NIH, FDA, HHS, GAO and the UK NHS, he is former President of the Society for Healthcare Epidemiology of America and Councillor of the Infectious Diseases Society of America. Dr. Maki has been listed in every edition of Best Doctors in America since 1982 and received numerous awards for teaching at the University of Wisconsin and nationally. In 1994 he received the CIPI Award of the International Congress on Infection Control of the Societe de Pathologie Infectioense de Langue Francise, WHO and CDC for global contributions to the prevention of infection. In 2000 he was made a Master of the American College of Physicians and was cited by the Infectious Diseases Society of America for lifetime achievements in the field of infectious diseases. In 2001 he received the Hilldale and Belzer awards from the University of Wisconsin-Madison for contributions in teaching, research and service. In 2002 he was named to the HHS Secretary's Council on Public Health Preparedness and in 2005, to the Editorial Board of CDC's Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report. In 2007, he was elected to the University Committee, the executive committee of the Faculty Senate and advisory to the Chancellor and Regents of the University of Wisconsin -Madison. In 2009, he received the Distinguished Alumi Award from the University of Wisconsin Medical Alumni Association.
